Begin with a topic sentence (also called a thesis statement) to introduce the title,
author, and the book's main theme (remember to italicize or underline the title of a
novel).

Follow with approximately SIX supporting sentences summarizing the key people and events in the story. Do not give away the ending!

Be specific about the following:

✓ What did you like/dislike about the author's writing style? That is, do you like how the author used words?
✓ Does the author do a good job of making you feel like you are "right there" in the story?
✓ What really stands out about the book (mood, characters, a particular scene, the setting)?

Things to avoid:

- ✓ No statements of "my book" or "the book I have read". Avoid using "the book" altogether!
- ✓ No YOU's, THEY's, PEOPLE's! Be specific.
- ✓ Minimal use of the word "I" (maybe TWO times is fine...)

Things to include:

- ✓ TRANSITIONS!
- ✓ A variety of sentence beginnings
- ✓ Good vocabulary
- ✓ Precise spelling and grammar
- ✓ Consistent verb tense throughout
- ✓ Your best effort!

Step Three: Combine the sentences above into your two-paragraph book review. Be sure to add transition words/phrases to help the sentences flow together. The final draft should be typed in Times New Roman, size 12 with the proper heading (see the example on first page). You will turn in your rough draft <u>and your final draft to your English teacher on Friday, September 7th.</u> There will be an in-class assessment the following week. You will be allowed to use both your book and completed assignment on the test. You will be given more information regarding the assessment when school resumes.
